Colorado Pharmacy Residency Teaching Certificate Program 2025-2026

Administered through the Department of Clinical Pharmacy University of Colorado Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences

Program Goal:

To provide an opportunity to enhance teaching skills through practical training and actual hands on teaching experience both in the university setting as well as the clinical practice setting. A focus will be placed on both classroom and clinical practice teaching/precepting. Participants of the program should feel comfortable with designing and implementing educational programs within the clinical practice environment, as well as gain adequate exposure to consider if a career in academia is desired. The Teaching Certificate is awarded to participants that successfully complete the program requirements.

Program Outcomes:

- 1) The program participant will be able to demonstrate their expanded knowledge in a variety of instructional settings.
- 2) The program participant will possess an enhanced teaching skill set to utilize in both the classroom and clinical setting
- 3) The program participant will be able to create a teaching portfolio following completion of required experiences.

Target Audience:

To some degree, all pharmacists are educators with the delivery and setting varying widely. As such, opportunities to develop skills as an educator are needed. The Colorado Pharmacy Residency Teaching Certificate Program is intended for pharmacists with an interest in developing skills to create and deliver effective education in a variety of settings including but not limited to classroom teaching, occasional lecturing and/or precepting of students. Participants do not have to be committed to a career path targeting full time academia.

Time Commitment and Requirements to Be Awarded Teaching Certificate

The Colorado Pharmacy Teaching Certificate Program will consist of the following components:

- 1) Attendance at regularly scheduled workshops (in person or remotely) in which a specific aspect of teaching is explored and participants are provided tools for success
- 2) Participation and evaluation of each participant within a defined area of teaching throughout the year
- 3) Completion of both pre- and post-program surveys is also required.

Monthly Workshops:

- □ Attendance at the first workshop on August 12, 2025 is mandatory. Thereafter, attendance at 5 of the 6 remaining workshops is required (i.e. a total attendance requirement of 6 of 7 workshops, including the first one on Aug 12).
- All workshops will be 2 hours in length and scheduled in the early evening from 6:00-8:00 pm Mountain Time (MT).
 - Pre-work will be required prior to each workshop to allow for optimal discussions during workshops. This pre-work will be available on Canvas (an online learning platform) at least 2 weeks in advance of the live session.

The expectation of the teaching certificate program is that participants will, at a minimum, co-precept IPPE/APPE students from local/regional schools of pharmacy
Evaluation of participants within this activity should be accomplished through the standard ASHP Goals and objectives pertaining to precepting that are required of each program

2)	Didact	ic Teaching Experience
		The expectation of the program is that participants are afforded the opportunity to provide a 1-hour traditional didactic presentation on a topic of their or their program's choosing. If not able to give a 1-hour presentation, this requirement may be met by delivering two 30-minute presentations.
		For some participants, there may be opportunities to provide a 1-hour didactic presentation within the curriculum of local/regional schools of pharmacy. It is the expectation that each individual residency program will provide the opportunity for this teaching experience for participants.
		Any setting in which the participant will deliver a 1-hour presentation (such as Grand Rounds, pharmacy staff education, CE presentation, etc.) may be used to meet this requirement. Presentation at the Residency Conference of the Rockies (or other similar resident conferences) will not be considered to meet this requirement
		 If residency program directors wish that their participants complete this requirement by delivering a lecture within the pharmacy curriculum of local schools of pharmacy, the Teaching Certificate coordinators will attempt to facilitate this. However, due to limited availability, we cannot guarantee that each resident may be afforded this opportunity.
		Evaluation of participants' performance should be completed using the rubric provided by the Colorado Pharmacy Residency Teaching Certificate Program, with a copy of the completed rubric submitted through Canvas.
3)	Small (Group Teaching/Facilitating
		The expectation is that participants will participate in active learning courses at local/regional schools of pharmacy
		The expectation is that each participant will have a <u>minimum of 10 hours of assessment and/or facilitation throughout the year.</u> Hours must be completed at a school or college of pharmacy, with at a <u>minimum 6 hours</u> at the CU Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences (can be done remotely, when available). The Colorado Pharmacy Residency Teaching Certificate Program's Facilitation Documentation form will be required to be submitted with a faculty signature for each completed facilitation session.
		The Colorado Pharmacy Residency Teaching Certificate program directors will be responsible for working with participants to set up the necessary classroom time to meet the requirement. It is the responsibility of residents to sign-up for these opportunities in a timely manner.
		Every effort to accommodate specific scheduling needs of each participant will be made. However, there may be limitations regarding the timing of opportunities for participation in active learning courses due to the curricular schedules of the participating schools.
		Evaluation of the participant's performance will be through self-assessment/reflection based on the individual facilitation experiences. The self-assessment/reflection will be submitted as part of the portfolio. There is no standard form for the reflection, thus examples will be provided.

Enrollment in Colorado Pharmacy Residency Teaching Certificate Program: Enrollment in the program will be open until July 31, 2025. Confirmation of enrollment will be sent by email from the Program Directors to the individual residents and their Residency Program Directors.

Program Completion

Program directors will review teaching portfolios and assess for completion of all program requirements in May. Participants who successfully completed all program requirements will receive their electronic teaching certificate via email in June.
